Catalogue description:

A continuation of Technical English I, with an emphasis on critical papers, culminating in term paper or papers. Reading in modern prose, nursing texts.

Purpose:

People read and write for many reasons. They read for entertainment, for information, and in order to enter a dialogue with the author so that they can make meaning for their identities and their worlds. They express private thoughts in their diaries and journals; they make lists in order to organize, and they write articles, memos, poems, fictions, and essays in order to make meaning for themselves and their community. The purpose of this course is to help students to read critically and to write critical short essays using their reading and writing abilities they have already learned in Technical English I.

In completing this course, students will be able to:

- -Formulate a critical/analytical thesis appropriate for a topic focused and given by the teacher.
- Use print and on-line resources to find reference materials specific to the topic.
- Learn to write an appealing opening and state a thesis appropriately.
- Incorporate quotations in papers while avoiding plagiarism.
- -Develop reading comprehension through identifying main ideas, supporting details, and the relationship between ideas.
- Identify cohesive devices (transitions, repetitions, pronoun referents).
- -Read critically to differentiate fact, opinion, inference, and speculation.
- Listen to the teacher and other students and try to understand the messages in connection with the subject being taught.
- To take part in class discussion related to the subject projected in the class.

Course requirements:

Technical English 2 is a reading and writing based course with emphasis on analysis of nursing texts. Since the purpose of the course is to understand and analyze nursing literature and to write coherent essays there will be plenty f writing in this course. Short analytical papers will be required for mid-term and for the end of the semester. There will be exams to test your comprehension of material. There will be reading and writing assignments for each class, an discussions in workshop manner. So class participation is a necessary requirement and part of the final grade. Journal entries are required to make you contemplate about your readings. You will need to have a portfolio and gradually type your journals and assignments and file them.
